# <u>Memory, Trauma, and Asylum Law: A Role for Neuroscience?</u>

CLBB Executive Director Francis Shen provided an update on the Center's <a href="mailto:emerging work around immigration">emerging work around immigration</a>, neuroscience, and <a href="mailto:trauma">trauma</a> at the Harvard Law School Petrie-Flom Center's Year in P/Review symposium. The Center is actively exploring the potential of applied neuroscience to advance immigration justice, identifying trauma and memory as two areas into which neuroscience might provide value to courts, attorneys, and litigants. The update follows the Center's earlier 2019 program on <a href="mailto:Trauma at the Border">Trauma at the Border</a>. The work is part of the <a href="mailto:Project on Law and Applied Neuroscience">Project on Law and Applied Neuroscience</a>, a collaboration between CLBB and the Petrie-Flom Center for Health Law Policy, Biotechnology, and Bioethics at Harvard Law School.
